

Balance of power system definition quizlet





Overview

The balance of power theory suggests that states may secure their position by preventing any one state from gaining enough to dominate all others. If one state becomes much stronger, the theory predicts it will take advantage of its weaker neighbors, thereby driving them to unite in a defensive coalition. Some maintain that a balance-of-power system is more stable than one with a dominant state, as aggression is unprofitable when the costs outweigh the benefits.

Definition The balance of power is a principle in international relations that aims to prevent any one nation or alliance from becoming too dominant by equally distributing power among competing states or alliances. It operates on the premise that equal power among states will deter aggressive actions and maintain stability. What is the balance of power?

The theory of the balance of power, where the distribution of power is equally shared amongst the appropriate entities, is a concept crucial to the study of International Relations and of war. When studied in relation to the 19th century, we can see that it is a major part of both contemporary and modern literature, thinking and politics.

How does a balance-of-power system work?

For a balance-of-power system to operate effectively, alliance formation must be fluid and continuous. States must be able to align and realign with other states solely on the basis of power considerations.

What is balance of power in international relations?

Balance of power, in international relations, is the posture and policy of a nation or group of nations protecting itself against another nation or group of nations by matching its power against the power of the other side, either by increasing their own power or by adding to their own power that of other states.

What is the source of stability in a balance-of-power system?

The source of stability in a balance-of-power system (equilibrium) may arise as an unintended consequence, either of actors seeking to maximize their power



or of the imperative for actors wishing to survive in a competitive self-help system to balance against threatening accumulations of power. See Waltz (1979), 88–93 and chap. 6. 37.

Is a balance-of-power system more stable than a dominant state?

Some realists maintain that a balance-of-power system is more stable than one with a dominant state, as aggression is unprofitable when there is equilibrium of power between rival coalitions.

How do States balance?

How states balance will depend on the distribution of capabilities among the greater powers. In bipolar distributions of power (two great powers) states will balance through internal military buildup. In multipolar distributions of power (three or more) states will balance through the formation of counterbalancing alliances.

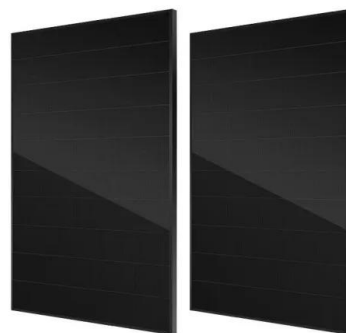

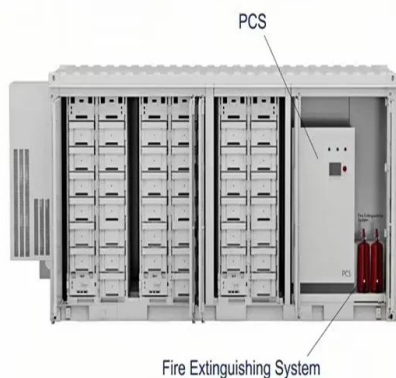
